The Buffalo News recently featured several letters from readers that were highly critical of the Diocese of Buffalo after

news of St. Lawrence, All Saints, and St. Andrew's Parishes closing. The viewpoints blamed the diocese's bankruptcy, the sex abuse scandal, and Church leadership for the decline.

costal and going to school for Theology taught me many beautiful things about

Scripture. My parents showed me what it meant to be a faithful Christian. But, after a time, everything felt dull, like the feeling when you eat and eat but you're still hungry. Jesus was about to fill me.

Michael and Hugh were the best teachers I could ever ask for. They were kind, patient, slow to speak, and quick to listen.

This situation, while concerning, also provides an opportunity to delve deeper into the causes and strategies for revitalization. To tackle these challenges, we need to understand what people think about our faith traditions. This will help us create clear messages that show why our traditions matter. We also need to find new ways to connect with diverse groups of people and focus on shared values.

Strategies for revitalization include: increasing outreach efforts to better understand needs/expectations of our community; increasing parish involvement in local issues/charities; enhancing visibility (social media and other digital platforms); and fostering a sense of spiritual community and cooperation through ecumenical activities.

For each individual parishioner, this underscores the importance of evangelization and fostering an authentic witness to everyone we encounter.

At this year's Easter Vigil, a remarkable 26 individuals received new sacraments. This is a powerful sign of hope. St. Gregory's possesses the capacity to rise to the occasion, lead others to Christ by example, and grow.

When people see genuine conviction and consistent living-out of one's beliefs, they are more likely to be intrigued and drawn to understand why and what we believe. This approach aligns with 1 Peter 3:15, which advises believers to "always be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks you to give the reason for the hope that you have."

days, I felt the enemy was trying to stop me from going. I experienced old temptations, fits of anger, terrible nightmares, and intense doubt. This only affirmed my decision to continue.



One day in the Café, I expressed my concerns about Marian teachings. But, there was a painting hanging right in front of me of Mary holding baby Jesus and a lamb. I could-

n't stop staring at it. Mary softened my heart at that moment. I knew she was trying to lead me to her Son.

Through the year, our group met for dinner. We got to know each other, laugh and cry together, and talk about our Faith. I didn't expect that when I joined RCIA. I believe Jesus was/is doing something bigger than we could hope and pray for. We needed to not only hear the truth about the Catholic Faith, but to see it lived out within each other outside of class.

I wish I could write about every single class. Each one was a gift. I've learned so much about the Faith. It has made me feel full. I don't feel that dullness and constant hunger I used to feel.

I was able to have these experiences because I asked Jesus to open my heart to what He was trying to show me each time I went to Mass and to class. Even if I came in with disagreements, I asked questions and listened intently. I asked Jesus so often to remove my pride. I had to switch my perspective and my understanding. It was tiring, lonely, and at times I felt hurt. I brought all these things to Jesus' feet when I went to Mass. I asked for clarity and understanding, and He always came through.

I have faith in Christ's Church because, simply, He created it. He ordained it. "Upon this rock I will build My Church; and the gates of Hades will not overpower it" (Matthew 16:18). What Jesus has said, will be. I have witnessed it in my classmates and in the lives of the saints. I have faith in His Church be-


cause Jesus answers our prayers for clarity, understanding, and wisdom with His unending grace and mercy.

for your support of efforts to maintain our parish campus! As you may have already observed, repairs to the exterior structures of the Church and School are either completed or currently underway. Both projects will do much to ensure our



current buildings remain standing for generations to come.

A little-known fact regarding our Ministry Center is that it has nine separate sections of roofing! Eight of those sections needed replacement. We sincerely appreciate your patience during temporary inconveniences,



such as restricted access points and warmer indoor temperatures due to the removal of rooftop AC units for the roofing work.

The good news is: with new roofing on sections one through eight, and section nine having a five-year-old roof, the entire interior of the building will be protected from the elements!

Thank you also to those who have volunteered their time to participate in our **GARDEN CLUB**. The Garden Club has been hard at work since early April on our 25 garden beds (yes there are 25!), the Grotto, Rosary Walk, and 12 planters.

Their work has included picking up trash, weeding, planting, trimming, feeding with fertilizer, deadheading, and then back to picking up trash, weeding, trimming, and deadheading.

We thank the dedicated individuals who come regularly and work in the cold, light rain, and/or blazing sun every Tuesday morning!

The Garden Club can always use an extra set of hands and are grateful for any amount of time that can be given. No experience is necessary, as there are members who are experienced gardeners who will gladly show you the difference between a plant and a weed! If you are interested, please call

In closing, we would like to make a simple ask regarding the GROTTO AREA AND THE GARDEN BEDS

around the Ministry Center. Please know the Grotto was built to honor the Blessed Mother and provide an outdoor sanctuary for quiet prayer, reflection, or gatherings of groups to pray together. We kindly ask that people refrain from leaving glass vases of flowers, potted plants, religious items, bird baths, bird feeders, and scattering breadcrumbs. The last two items are of particular importance because seed and breadcrumbs attract mice and rats, which we do not want on our parish property.

Thank you for your anticipated support to keep the Grotto area as it was created to be and to discourage mice and/or rats from using our campus as a feeding ground. ■

Our goal is to educate everyone in our Family of Parishes on how Stewardship is vital for the Church's health and vibrancy. This is an invitation to deepen our commitment to prayer and ministry.

SERVING IN HOPE

The motto of the Society of St. Vincent dePaul, Serviens in Spe, means "To Serve in Hope." We serve in hope by bringing the love of God to those who are poor and suffering, living in poverty, and facing discrimination.

St. Gregory's SVdP Conference was formed in the early 1960s, when the parish was founded, to serve the Town of Amherst. Over decades, we have expanded our scope from VISITING THE SICK at Millard Fillmore Suburban Hospital, to purchasing a truck for collecting FURNITURE AND APPLIANCE DONATIONS, to many other forms of direct personal contact, practicing the Corporal Works of Mercy.

We serve in hope by making 200 HOME VISITS annually to those most in need in WNY. This is the central and most basic activity of SVdP Conferences and the clearest symbol of our Vincentian charism, which dictates the highest respect for the dignity of the poor. Vincentians "see the face of Christ in those we serve." We are best able to assess the needs of the people we serve in their home environment.

We bring hope by welcoming the stranger. Working with other SVdP Conferences, Catholic Charities, and REFUGEE SETTLEMENT organizations in the region, St. Gregory Vincentians helped 40 new families re-locate to the Buffalo area over the past two years. Teams of volunteers have cleaned and painted apartments, moved furniture and appliances, and provided clothing to make dwellings into homes for those fleeing the perils of war and famine.

We serve to bring hope to those imprisoned. A small group of our SGG SVdP membership engages with the Kairos and Residents Encounter Christ organizations to spread the love and forgiveness of Jesus Christ to men at the Wende Correctional Facility in Alden. Our volunteers participate in MONTHLY GROUP DISCUSSIONS WITH THE IMPRISONED, including Bible study, prayer, and faith sharing.

We feed the hungry. Our parish's SPRING AND FALL FOOD DRIVES not only supply food for our home visitations, but contribute to walk-in SVdP food pantries at St. Timothy's and St. Francis of Assisi in Tonawanda, and the Response to Love Center and St. Luke's Mission of Mercy in Buffalo.



- their sometimes busy and confusing lives.
- ⊕ Our Monday evening classes for Grades 5-10 begin by gathering in the Gym, where we create space for quiet prayer and lead a decade of the Rosary.
- When some of our key older volunteers had to step back from their roles, many of our 88 Confirmation candidates volunteered for our parish's core fundraisers.
- Teens who were involved in volunteering in younger Faith Formation classes expressed how impactful it was to share their Faith with the children.
- t's not uncommon to find teens from Family Faith Formation actively engaged in various aspects of parish life, such as Music Ministry and Youth Ministry.
- While society says that teens and parents often have rough patches, many of our teens at our recent Confirmation retreats named their parents and grandparents among the people they most look up to and respect.
- Several of our classes were fortunate to have unique experiences through special productions and visits from our Youth Ministers.
- ⊕ Our teens regularly meet with their Confirmation Sponsors and develop connections with their Catechists.
- Many participated in a Family of Parishes Confirmation Retreat at St. Pius X, while others joined the two retreats organized by the Youth Ministry.
- l've seen a personal transformation in some teens in our program. A number of teens have also returned to church and first sacraments through our programs.
- Several teens received First Communion at the Easter
